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MARKET RESEARCH





➤ Executive Overview

The following are highlights from the Lheidli T'enneh Final Agreement Survey 2007:

- Market research was completed with 130 Lheidli T'enneh band members to better understand initial barriers to enrolment in the voting process, key reasons for members voting decisions and sources of influence on those decisions.
- Overall, more than 9-in-10 members enrolled to vote, while the majority of the 1-in-10 who did not vote say the reason was that they live or work outside of the area, or were simply unavailable for the vote.
- Of those enrolled a further 9-in-10 eventually cast a vote, and among those who did not vote, once again the main reason was simply being unable to make it in time; however a minority abstained due to objections to the offer itself.
- In all 57% of those participating in the survey say they voted "yes" to the final agreement, versus 39% voting "no", with 4% who preferred not to disclose their voting decision.



➤ Executive Overview (cont'd)

- Those voting “yes” most commonly did so because they felt it was fair and the best deal for the band; it was described as a good land deal, providing jobs and other economic and educational opportunities. Some also felt that it was time for self-governing.
- Almost half of those who voted “no” did so because they felt the band was not yet ready for self-governing, needing more experience before managing land and money successfully. Others however felt it was simply a poor deal in which the band would ultimately lose in terms of land, status, entitlement and benefits.
- Half of all members made use of the printed information they received regarding the final agreement before making their voting decision, while about one-third relied on information gathered from Treaty meetings, with a similar proportion looking to family members for guidance.
- Other more minor sources of information include CTC meetings, other treaty or band members, friends and the web-site.

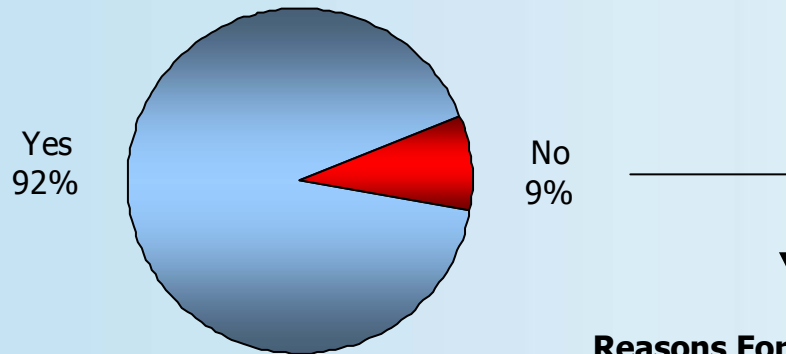


➤ Methodology

- As part of the BC Treaty Commission analysis of the Lheidli T'enneh Final Agreement ratification vote that took place March 27-30, 2007, market research was conducted in an attempt to poll all Lheidli T'enneh band members.
- The primary objective of the research is to better understand the main reasons the Final Agreement was not ratified, identifying barriers to enrolment in the voting process, key reasons for members voting decisions and sources of influence on those decisions.
- The member database provided contained 260 telephone contacts, 49 with mailing addresses and 8 with no point of contact. Those 49 members with a mailing address were delivered a paper copy of the survey, with a postage paid envelope included to return their opinions. A total of 130 (127 phone and 3 mail return surveys) were completed.
- Additional steps taken to encourage all members to respond to the survey include making up to 8 calls to contact each member and assuring members of confidentiality and privacy of their responses which are protected by federal legislation (PIPEDA).
- Margin of error on finite sample: +/-6.6% at 95% level of confidence;
- Interviewing was conducted May 24th to June 5th, 2007.



➤ Enrolled to Vote on Lheidli T'enneh Final Agreement



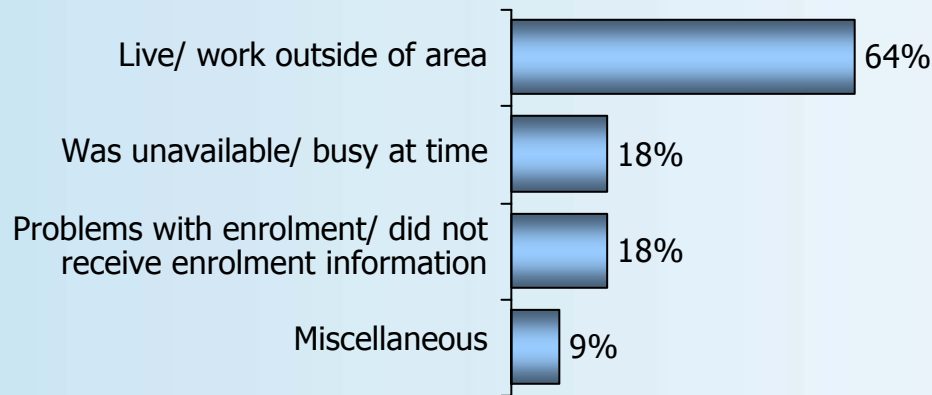
- Approximately 9-in-10 band members enrolled to vote on the Lheidli T'enneh Final Agreement, through the eligibility and enrolment process.

Reasons For Choosing Not to Enrol



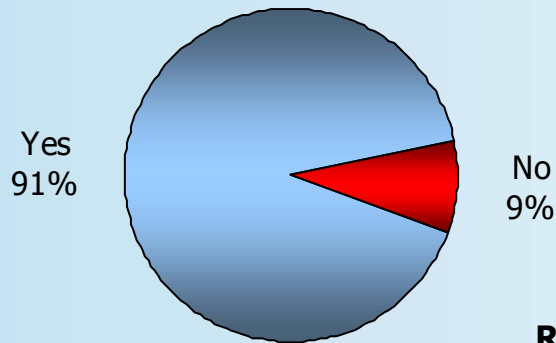

- Of the 9% of members who did not enrol, most did not as they live and work outside of the area, or were simply too busy.
- About 1-in-5 did not enrol due to problems encountered when trying to enrol or because they did not receive any notice to do so.



➤ Voted on Lheidli T'enneh Final Agreement



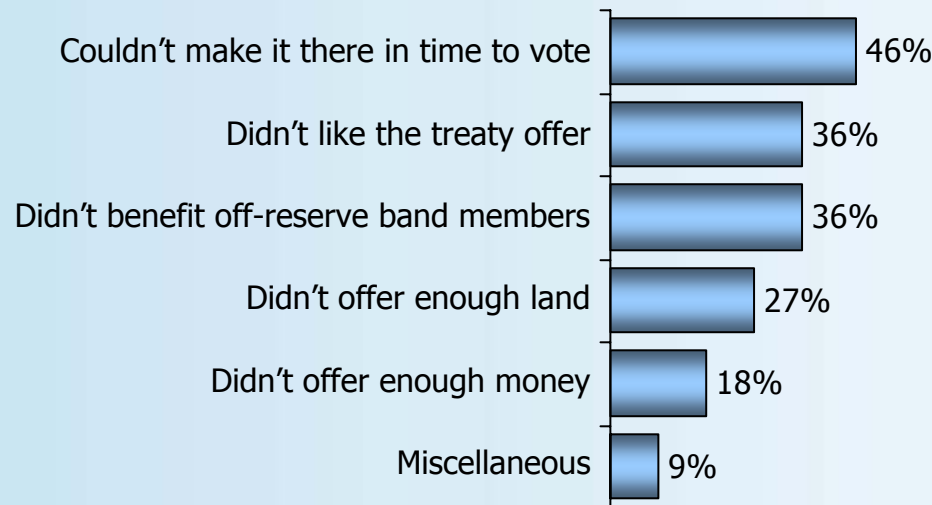
- Of those who had enrolled to vote, about 9-in-10 actually did vote.

Reasons For Choosing Not to Vote



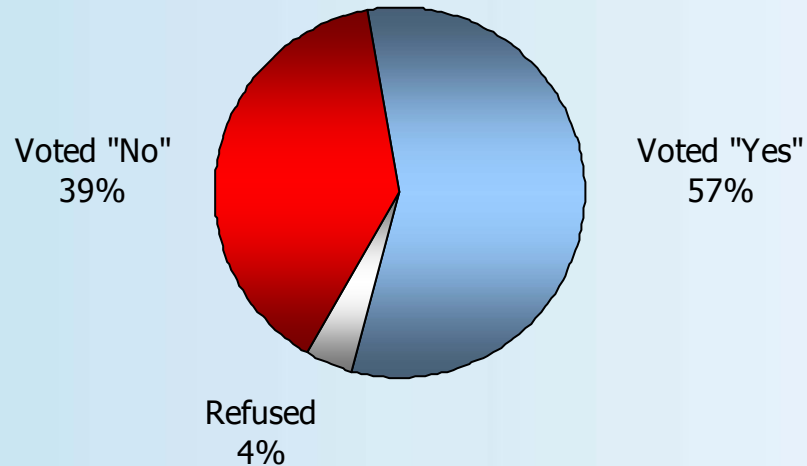
- The main barrier to voting for almost half of those unable to vote was simply lack of time.
- However, some expressed dissatisfaction with the treaty offer itself causing them to abstain.

➤ Final Agreement Vote



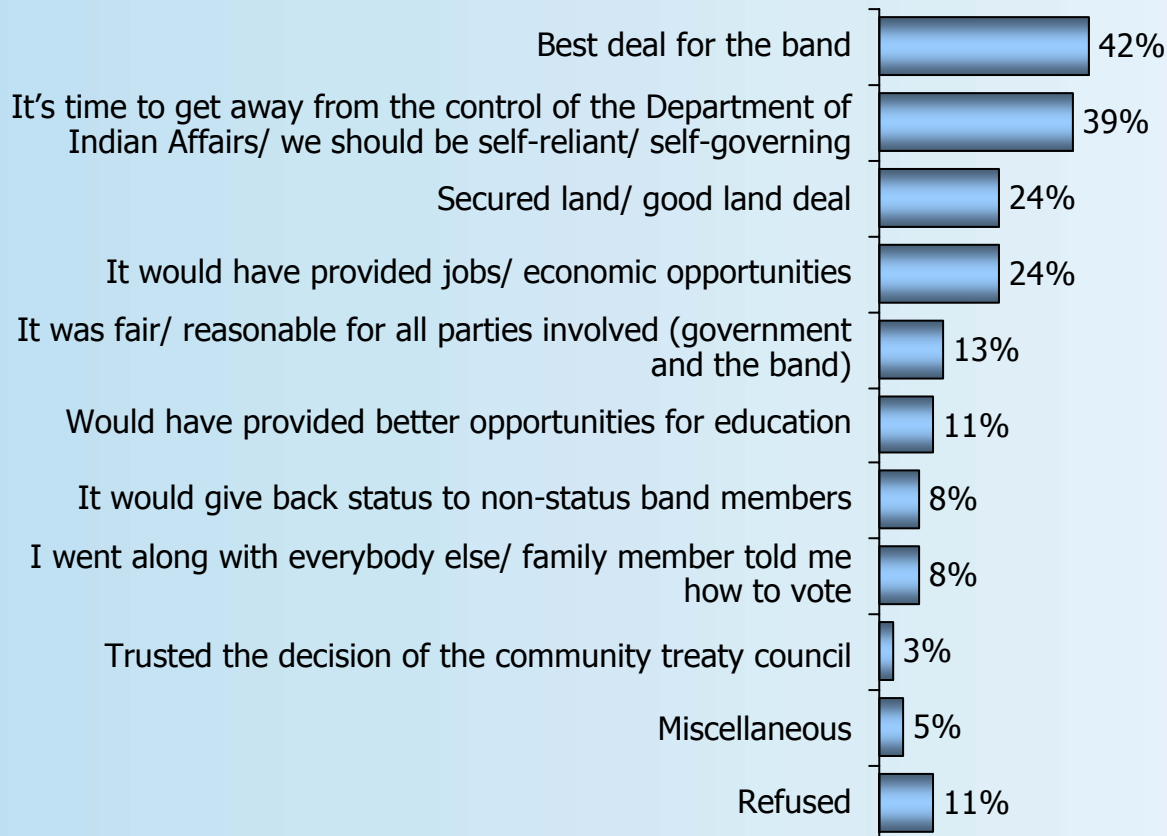
- Overall, a slight majority of members, just over half, say they voted "yes" to the final agreement, while 37% voted against.

► Reasons for Voting “Yes”



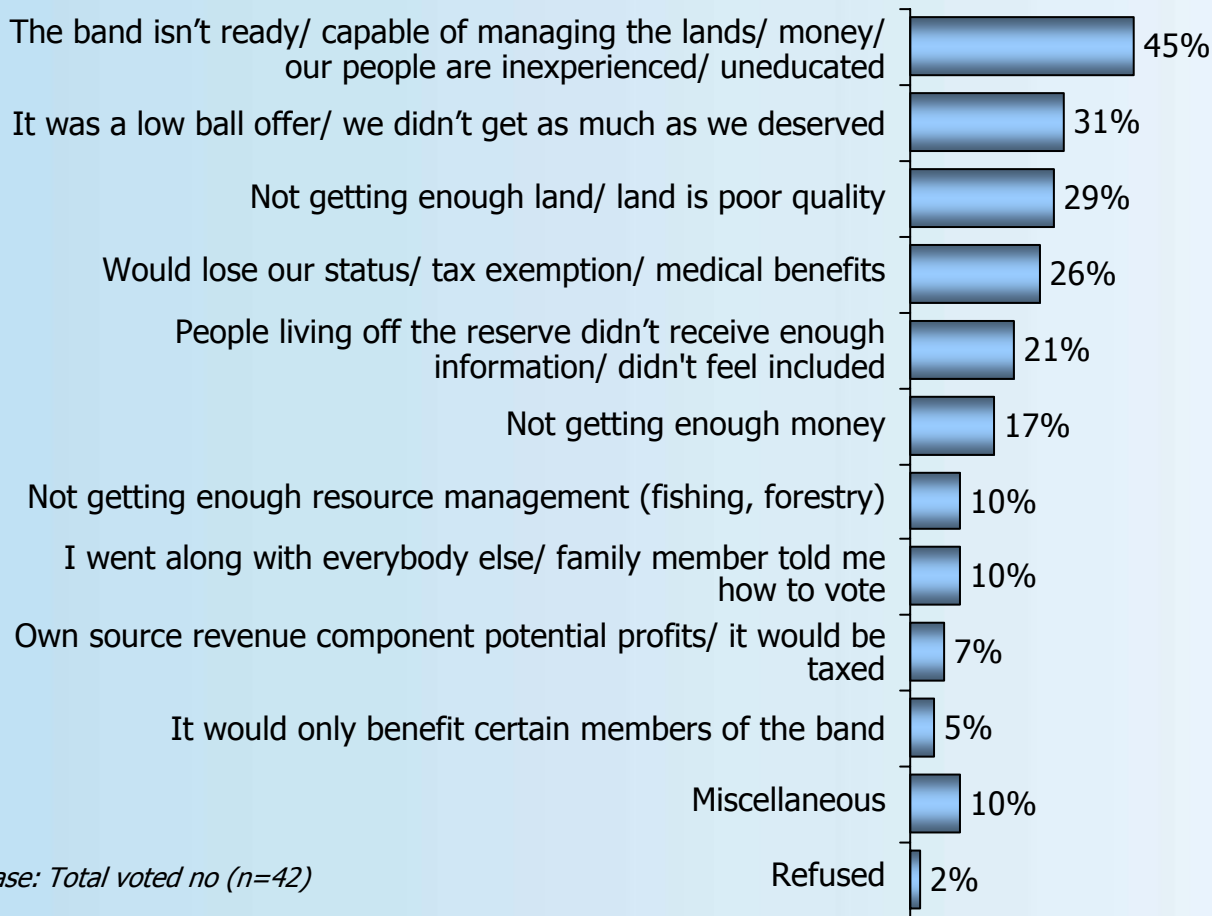

Q.5b) Why did you choose to vote yes?

- Those voting “yes” most commonly did so because they felt it was fair and the best deal for the band, that it was a good land deal, providing jobs and other economic and educational opportunities.
- Many also felt that it was time, to leave the control of the Department of Indian Affairs and the opportunity for self-governing.



➤ Reasons for Voting “No”



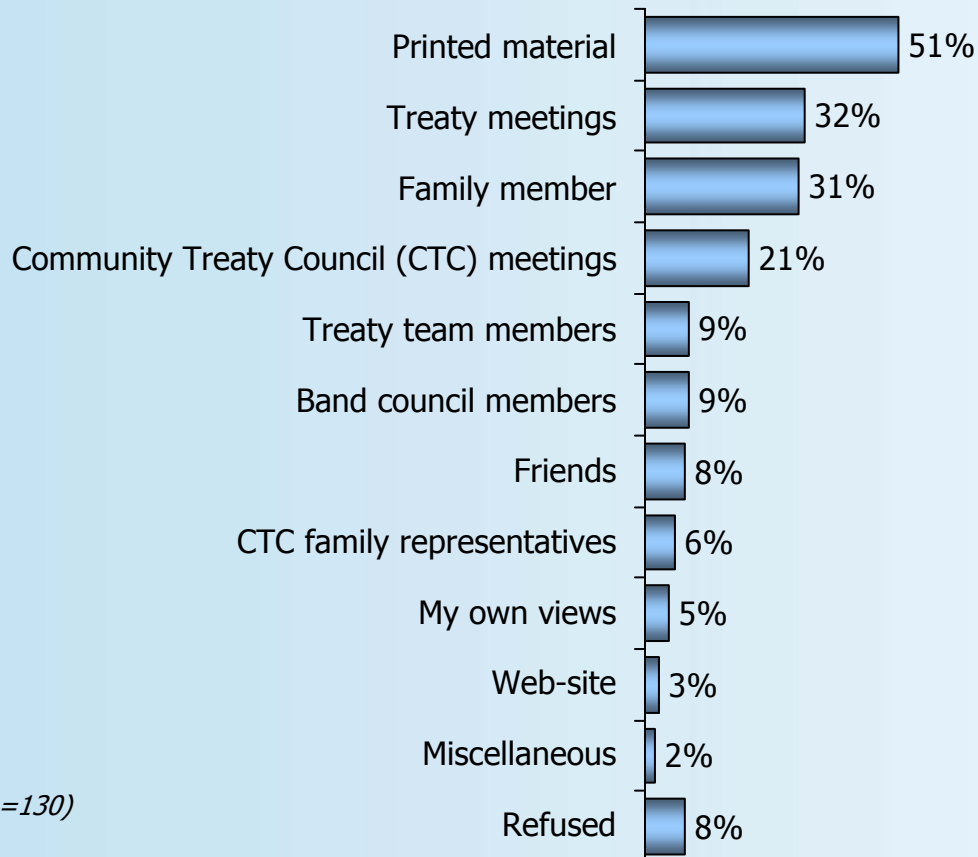

Q.5b) Why did you choose to vote no?

- Almost half of those who voted “no” did so because they felt the band was not yet ready for self-governing, needing more experience before managing land and money successfully.
- Others however felt it was simply a poor deal in which the band would ultimately lose in terms of land, status, entitlement and benefits.
- Others further felt not enough information was provided to members living off the reserve.



➤ Sources of Influence on Voting Decision



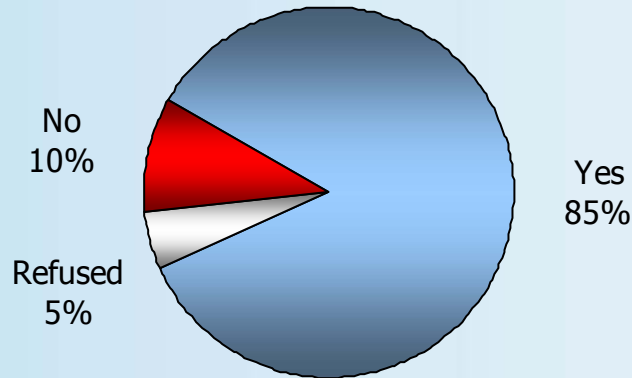

Q.6) Where did you get information that influenced your decision-making?

- Half of all members felt their voting decision was influenced by the printed information they received regarding the final agreement.
- Approximately one-third relied on information gathered from Treaty meetings, with a similar proportion receiving guidance from family members.
- About 1-in-5 members also took note of information at CTC meetings, while the remaining sources varied between other treaty or band members, friends and the web-site.



➤ Listed as a Band Member



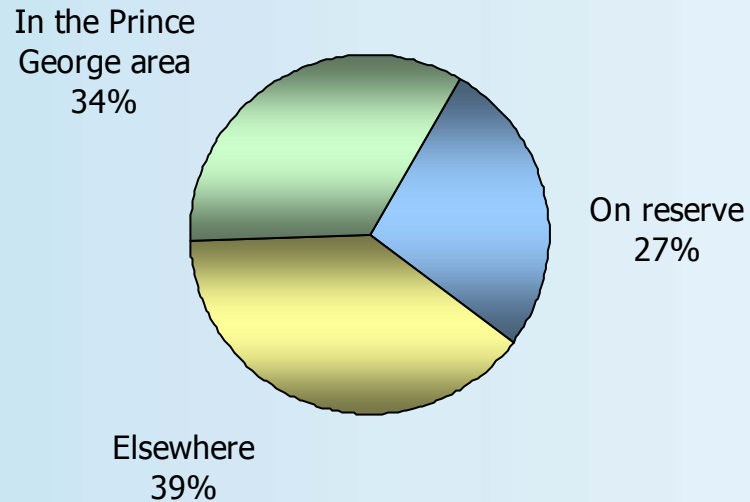
- Almost 9-in-10 participants report that they are currently listed as band members of the Lheidli T'enneh Indian band.

Verbatim Responses



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➤ Q.4) Why Did You Choose Not to Vote

- I didn't like the treaty, the land that we got was very minimal - it was low quality. The BC government made an offer and then they didn't care any more.
- We received our papers too late to vote - we received our papers after the vote had taken place. So we were unable to vote.
- Because I live off-reserve, and I felt that the people who live on-reserve should make the decision.
- I did not agree with the treaty.
- I was told that we would not be band members. We just got accepted as band members, and we don't have Indian status yet, and we we're told we would not get Indian status. We're not really part of the band, and we're not going to get Indian status. I didn't vote because I felt the treaty doesn't affect me.
- Because I didn't have time. I was busy. I just couldn't get down there to vote. 25 minutes, half an hour, maybe.
- I just didn't make it there on time to vote. No other reason.

➤ Q.4) Why Did You Choose Not to Vote (cont'd)

- Because I was told that if I didn't vote, it would be counted as a "no" vote. Another band member told me. I was leaning "no" because I didn't think it was fair for the off-reserve band members. Because then we would be invisible after the treaty. We wouldn't be included. They just wanted our "yes" or "no" votes. We wouldn't be included in any of the job openings, and we would lose our medical after the agreement. Education for off-reserve would be lost. There's too much nepotism, family favouritism, and nothing would change.
- Basically the treaty did not have all that I thought it should. It didn't cover all the issues and concerns of off-reserve band members. The treaty didn't recognize them. It seems off-reserve band members were forgotten, neglected. Basically, we have no rights. There weren't enough resources for the band to sustain itself. Not enough money, and not enough land. And the band doesn't have the people needed to successfully implement the treaty.
- My car broke down on my way to vote and I was unable to make it in time. There is no bussing for the weekend - the Greyhound don't make any weekend runs.
- I had some vehicle problems. I had planned to vote, and to vote "no" because the parcel of land wasn't big enough. The cash wasn't big enough. It was just vehicle problems. I had planned to vote, but couldn't get there.



➤ Q.5a) Why Did You Choose to Vote “Yes”

- Reason #1: the best deal the band could've gotten. From the propaganda I got from the band, it was the best deal they could get. The land, the money, and the whole package.
- Reason #2: it was going to give us our rights back. My rights back. I'm not a band member. It was put to me, that if I voted yes, I'd get my rights back. I was going to get put on the band list, and my children, and their children, and become a full member of the nation.
- Reason #1: Basically because I trusted what the community treaty council said, because they were part of the treaty negotiations.
- Reason #1: I've seen what it was like before, and I thought the treaty would be a better way to go.
- Reason #1: Because I thought it was fair. It was reasonable for us and the government. The land that they were going to give us was great, and we had plans for it.
- Reason #2: I thought it was time to govern ourselves. Because it's time to break the leash on Indian affairs and all their rules and govern our own nation.

➤ Q.5a) Why Did You Choose to Vote “Yes” (cont’d)

- Reason #1: Because I thought we should move on and get out from under DIA. I think the government is racist. All of it. We should be more self-reliable, rather than just lie on reserves and do nothing, which is what the government wants.
- Reason #1: Because it was the best thing going , because of the land
- Reason #1: I was a negotiator up to the agreement in principal, and I was quite involved for 10 yrs up to 2 yrs ago. I voted yes because economically we would be able to sustain ourselves if the financial and the selection of land was managed properly.
- Reason #2: Creating certainty and having the ability to govern ourselves where we are not dependent on others. Regards to our future, we're in charge of our own future. And in control and first to govern ourselves.
- Reason #3: The jurisdiction is clearly defined by the treaty and supporting documents.
- Reason #1: To settle our treaty. To take whatever they were offering. Everybody thought it was good. I was just going with the flow.
- Reason #1: We wouldn't be under the Indian Act any more.

➤ Q.5a) Why Did You Choose to Vote “Yes” (cont’d)

- Reason #2: more opportunities for the members, with the land and money. Economically. More jobs.
- Reason #1: I think that for the future of your children and grandchildren. I see the agreement providing for that.
- Reason #2: It would be good for the band to have the land management under their control.
- Reason #1: I was one of the negotiators, and I thought it was a pretty fair deal. It gave us a chance to get on our feet, and do things ourselves. We would be able to get out from Indian Affairs, and we'd have self-government.
- Reason #2: the land quantum offered, gave us a lot of economic potential, worth millions. Ten to twenty years down the road. Opportunities for economic growth, that we could keep over time.
- Reason #1: My dad told me to go in, and vote yes. It was a hard choice for our family.
- Reason #1: Because of the amount of economic opportunities available to all band members under the proposed agreement. It provided opportunities for band members to have self-owned businesses, and for greater job opportunities.



➤ Q.5a) Why Did You Choose to Vote “Yes” (cont’d)

- Reason #2: The land package identified had high economic potential, and is ideal for future residential development.
- Reason #3: the entire final agreement was community driven. It wasn't driven and drafted by lawyers and accountants. It was shaped by the community.
- Reason #1: Because I thought it was a good deal for the younger generation coming up behind us and for my community.
- Reason #1: I wanted a change for the better for the kids and to get rid of the D.I.H criteria.
- Reason #2: I wanted the challenge, and to teach our children the modern way instead of living in the past.
- Reason #1: To eliminate the unnecessary need for the department of the Indian and Northern Affairs.
- Reason #1: it gives us self-government .
- Reason #2: the future generations will have something for them. . They will have their own land and water.

➤ Q.5a) Why Did You Choose to Vote “Yes” (cont’d)

- Reason #3: They, future generations, will have the right to own their own property, their own land, like someone in town, owning their own homes.
- Reason #1: I want the people from it to have a chance at a better life. There will be greater opportunities with the treaty. There are bigger opportunities with the treaty.
- Reason #2: Education, more opportunities.
- Reason #1: The land package. It was a number of parcels that were valuable to us. Face value they're worth good money. The airport is good land.
- Reason #2: The governance section of the treaty. It would give all the powers to our family, and control over the land. It would remove the dia and the Indian act.
- Reason #1: At the time I was looking out for the future generations, but I realized there was a lack of administrative and knowledge keepers within it to follow through with the treaty agreements. So now I feel I should have voted no.
- Reason #1: I thought it was a good package for our community.
- Reason #1: Medical. The medical coverage that I would have received through the band if the agreement had gone through.

➤ Q.5a) Why Did You Choose to Vote “Yes” (cont’d)

- Reason #1: I like the way the agreement was all set up and it was all laid out and I thought it was a decent agreement.
- Reason #2: I like the idea how they were going to help the community, with the fishery and there were a few things that looked very nice. I liked how it was written and thought it would be good for the band.
- Reason #3: I only had one issue and it had to do with the school - there should have been more funding for education. More opportunity, help them graduate, have a trade or a career.
- Reason #1: I did it for five years straight. Every week we met, and I just wanted it done. The offer has never gotten that much bigger. Start now, invest the money now. Get on with it.
- Reason #2: Have to pay off out of the settlement. It won't get much better. (No 2nd or 3rd reason)
- Reason #1: because I believe what they were trying to do would benefit everybody. The band. The land. They would become independent, even if they had to pay taxes.

➤ Q.5a) Why Did You Choose to Vote “Yes” (cont’d)

- Reason #2: Ron Seymour worked on that for 12 years, and if he did, it had to be good. The guy in treaty office, working on the treaty.
- Reason #3: They would be able to develop the mineral rights and begin making money, rather than just receiving money in handouts from government.
- Reason #1: I thought that it was a change. It would be self-government, instead of being run by Indian Affairs. It would be good for the people to be independent.
- Reason #2: it could help the people more. The band could spread out, and individual members could get jobs with the band.
- Reason #1: I think it would be beneficial for the band members. Our people have been bitching for years that we have been under the rule of the government, and it's time to do something about it. We would, as a people have our own government and laws.
- Reason #2: I'm non-status. For my children. If we had the land back, that could lead to business opportunities, and allow my children to go back to their heritage. It would help preserve our heritage.
- Reason #1: I think like anyone else they should be able to run their own band.

➤ Q.5a) Why Did You Choose to Vote “Yes” (cont’d)

- Reason #1: Just as a nation to get on with things. As a people we've remained stagnant under the government and it's time to get on with things and manage our own affairs with self-government, and that's not possible while under Indian affairs.
- Reason #2: Having the opportunity for sustained economic growth, independently. With the land acquisitions and the land set aside, I could see how if it was managed properly, I can see how it would provide for jobs, and economic growth sustainable.
- Reason #1: I figure that the band has nothing as it is, and if it did go through, they could make something with the money. I'd hope that they'd start with supporting the opening of small businesses and work their way up to larger things.
- Reason #1: I don't really care about that stuff, I just went with my mom, and did what she did. I don't have any status. My mom's the one with status, and wanted me to vote that was it.
- Reason #1: It would be the thing to do for them to go out on their own. They could get into business. The government provides for them. If they were out on their own, they'd have the incentive to provide for themselves.
- Reason #1: I thought that was the right way to go. Because they took so long to get to where they were, I thought that was the way to go. The whole package itself I thought was good.

➤ Q.5a) Why Did You Choose to Vote “Yes” (cont’d)

- Reason #1: I felt it might benefit the band. More independence. To do their own thing, I guess. Making their own decisions.
- Reason #1: I thought it was a decent opportunity for the band. These people have a lot of potential in the area they lived on. An opportunity for them to grow as a self-governing people on their own land, the land of their fathers.
- Reason #1: Better schooling. For college.
- Reason #2: For the fishing. I enjoy fishing, and I haven't gone out into the wild because of the licences required.
- Reason #1: Opportunities for the first nation. Economic development.
- Reason #2: Human resource capacity building. Education.
- Reason #3: Employment. Whatever the band wanted. Whatever the priorities are for providing long term employment for it's members.
- Reason #1: If it passed, my family would become status. We've been trying for years to gain status. Status as natives, belonging to the band.
- Reason #2: There would be closure for the land claim, and a guarantee of land for future generations.

➤ Q.5a) Why Did You Choose to Vote “Yes” (cont’d)

- Reason #3: The Lheidli T'enneh would finally be in control of their own destiny. No longer a foster child of the federal government. In the past, everything involving natives had to go through the Canadian government, and with the treaty, self-government.
- Reason #1: Basically I hoped that Lheidli would move forward to the future. The opportunities presented by the treaty. Opportunities for members to benefit from education funding, and natural resource availability and land available.
- Reason #2: Self-government. Not being under the Indian and northern affairs. Getting away from being status Indians and creating our own laws based on what we believe.
- Reason #1: Because it was a good deal. I believe everyone put everything on the table and worked it out for a number of years.
- Reason #2: I know a lot of people wanted money. But its for the next generation, its for the future.
- Reason #1: The self-government that we have now through the Indian act is inadequate. We could govern our own money. We could arrange for a child care program.
- Reason #2: We would retain our medical and status cards.

➤ Q.5a) Why Did You Choose to Vote “Yes” (cont’d)

- Reason #1: That the treaty process had gone on long enough, a long time. I think it would be good for the band to move on from the treaty process, and moving on in life.
- Reason #2: The economic benefits were quite good for band members. Money would've been given to us.
- Reason #1: Because of greed. I thought they'd do it like the Alberta bands did it, receiving an annual payment to members.
- Reason #1: Because the reading I did lead me to believe it was the right way to vote.
- Reason #1: It would be better for the people because of self-government. I've been an officer for 10 years, and we should have a say in what goes on. In the band office.
- Reason #2: And because of land. The resources on the land. The wood. The mineral rights. It was quite a lot of land. I was surprised to see how much.
- Reason #3: For the future of my children. There will be better resources for them. Like the salmon. We'll have more say over what happens with the resources.

➤ Q.5a) Why Did You Choose to Vote “Yes” (cont’d)

- Reason #1: Better for the younger people growing up. Better education. Better schooling.
- Reason #2: They were going to gain land, and gain a source of revenue, develop it as a source of revenue.
- Reason #3: The thought of them running their own government was appealing to me, and not relying on the government of Canada.
- Reason #1: Right now, I'm not eligible to become a band member, and if I voted yes, I'd be able to gain status with the band.
- Reason #2: I thought it was a good deal for the band. They'd be able to run themselves.
- Reason #1: I thought it was a good thing. I was in agreement with the treaty.
- Reason #1: It would create a lot of money for the band. There was a lot of land. The land the government was going to give us was going to create money for the band. By building condos on some of it, selling leases on it.



➤ Q.5a) Why Did You Choose to Vote "Yes" (cont'd)

- Reason #1: I didn't get the paper work until quite late, and after speaking with my dad and sister I decided to vote yes. They had taken the time to read all the paper work and it sounded very positive, so I voted yes.
- Reason #1: Because I thought it was a good thing. Nothing in particular.
- Reason #1: I went with what my parents were doing and it will help out my children later on.
- Reason #1: It seemed as though they had spent a lot of time and money on the process, and the people working on it seemed quite capable, and I felt confident in what they'd come up with.
- Reason #2: People seemed unhappy with the way they've been treated in the past, and this seemed it might be beneficial.
- Reason #1: It would be a good thing for the young generation. It's a pretty poor reserve. There'd be money there to train, educate, and get some business going. It's a pretty poor reserve, and it would be good for them in the future.

➤ Q.5a) Why Did You Choose to Vote “Yes”

- Reason #2: I don't have status. They tell me I'm not a native, I'm brown, I have roots in the band. I'd gain official status within the band. The white-man government wouldn't let me be a native, but under self-government, they'd give me my status.
- Reason #1: I think its the right choice to vote yes



➤ Q.5b) Why Did You Choose to Vote “No”

- Reason #1: Because it's only run by certain families in the community. The treaty office, the treaty staff. The agreement was only going to benefit the staff who work in the office, and their families. No one else. Nothing would change.
- Reason #2: The CTC table did not work. Because I've seen youth, and elders try to make comments, and I've seen CTC members just laugh at their comments.
- Reason #1: The native band was low-balled on every facet. In terms of land we're the biggest nation, and we were only given a few grains of sand on a map of BC. Homesteaders, immigrants, got 150 acres a person.
- Reason #2: Financially it's a bad deal. Canada, the government, take billions and billions of resources out of our territories, and they can afford to give us more. The cash settlement offered is hugely inadequate.
- Reason #3: Just because many of our families, over generations, have perished, because we're a small number of people, they didn't offer much. We've never been conquered, and the government refuses to acknowledge we're citizens plus, with extra rights.
- Reason #1: We're not getting enough land.
- Reason #2: We're not getting enough money.

➤ Q.5b) Why Did You Choose to Vote "No" (cont'd)

- Reason #3: We're not getting enough fish.
- Reason #1: I didn't think there was enough land or money or fish or timber on the treaty. For certain projects - which was the whole point of the treaty.
- Reason #2: We get annual funding for education and health for 50 years. Its limited funding. We have to pay part of the funding. After the 50 years we are on our own.
- Reason #1: I wasn't pleased with what was on the table. One the forestry - what they gave us to cut. I wasn't happy with what they offered. The amount they gave us would only keep the company afloat - nothing more.
- Reason #2: The money value, wasn't enough for me. We were given only so much then we have to pay back \$6 million.
- Reason #1: Land. The land selected for the agreement wasn't the land we brought to the table. The land in the agreement wasn't as economically as significant.
- Reason #1: My nation just wasn't ready. I'm ready, but many aren't ready yet. Some of us are in the little league, and others are in the majors. I didn't want my future in the hands of people who didn't know what they're doing. I didn't trust some of the people with the money we would get, or the land we were given, to have it 50 years down the road as a resource. A lot of people wanted to know what's in it for them now, not for the children 50 years down the road.



➤ Q.5b) Why Did You Choose to Vote “No” (cont’d)

- Reason #1: The band isn't ready. There's not enough educated and skilled people to provide suitable self-government. We just don't have the skills or capacity to take that on at this time.
- Reason #2: The O.S.R. Component. Own source revenue. If we make over and above a certain sum of money, that's taken from our transfer payments.
- Reason #3: Taxation. I will always vote no if it means I will ever be taxed. By the government. Both levels.
- Reason #1: I don't think it was a good enough deal. There wasn't a strong foundation of self-government set for us. We don't have jobs. We're not ready for this, and the unemployment rate is too high. Without one, you can't have the other.
- Reason #2: The land that they offered wasn't surveyed by any of the band members, when it should've been. Go out and see what kind of wildlife habitat and streams. How much forestry cutting's been done.
- Reason #3: It's a lowball offer. Other nations got more than we do. We're a bigger nation, and smaller nations were given more than we were. More land, money, and economic opportunities, which lead to employment.

➤ Q.5b) Why Did You Choose to Vote “No” (cont’d)

- Reason #1: It was a low-offer deal, compared to what other nations were offered. Other nations got \$50 million cash and a lot more land, and they claimed a lot less land than our land. The land we've claimed.
- Reason #2: We had no real basis to govern the money sufficiently. We don't have the education and the jobs to handle it. It's like living in a third world country. Not capable of sustaining self-government.
- Reason #3: There's not much there for future generations, it's all logged out, and they were talking about leasing it out for 50 or a 100 years.
- Reason #1: Because they used the word investment. They said they were going to invest our money into land investment. Previously chiefs invested money and it cost us about \$5 million and we are still paying those debts off.
- Reason #2: We looked at the future and in about 25 years the pot of money and the land - that soup bone is going to be bare. At least we're living free - although barley making ends meet we still have the freedom to negotiate.
- Reason #1: Because my uncle told me to.
- Reason #1: Regarding the enrolment. I don't agree with the enrolment. It's like holding a gun to his head to force him to vote in the election. It's wrong that in order to vote, he has to be enrolled.

➤ Q.5b) Why Did You Choose to Vote “No” (cont’d)

- Reason #2: Why should the band get all its resources, while the members of the band are getting nothing? The band members aren't going to see any of the money. I think the members should get a one-time, generous donation of cash and land.
- Reason #3: There was no road map on how the money and land was going to be used in the future to benefit the Lheidli T'enneh nation.
- Reason #1: The members are getting \$3,000 per person, and I have a big family, which is mostly girls, and only one nephew. The girls need it. \$3,000 isn't enough for a member.
- Reason #2: They're not offering individual members land. I don't think the band will do anything with the land we're getting. Individuals should be given land.
- Reason #1: I don't think the offer is adequate. From what I saw of the shortened version was a large portion of the land being given back to aboriginals is unusable. A lot of it is swamp.
- Reason #2: The financial portion is far too low.
- Reason #3: The band responsibility. The band will receive self government, and the people just aren't educated enough to implement taxation and run a government. We aren't prepared yet.

➤ Q.5b) Why Did You Choose to Vote “No” (cont’d)

- Reason #1: I don't believe in selling our land that's been in our people for thousands, hundred's of years.
- Reason #2: The small amount of land given us in the agreement wouldn't provide for our children in the future.
- Reason #1: I don't think we're ready for self-government. I don't want to lose my status. Because we haven't got enough educated people to run a government.
- Reason #1: The self-government. I don't feel there are enough Lheidli members to fill the positions required in that short a period of time. There would be undereducated people, and they're either too young, or too old to fill a government.
- Reason #2: I would've like to see enough land for the entire band to live on. We're already short of housing and land to live on.
- Reason #3: I would've like to explore alternative methods of governance, rather than following the Canadian democratic model, going back to traditional method of government. Collective rather than individual land and authority.
- Reason #1: I don't think there are enough educated people to run a self-government. There's not enough housing either.

continued...



➤ Q.5b) Why Did You Choose to Vote “No” (cont’d)

- Reason #2: People off the reserve have been offered nothing. I feel they should offer all band members money, other bands have done that. Or housing.
- Reason #3: And we lose our tax-exempt status, and medical.
- Reason #1: I wasn't clear on how it would include people living off reserve.
- Reason #1: They don't include anybody living off the reserve. They don't explain what's going to happen afterwards. 52% of the members have moved off the reserve because there's no work. How are we included. They didn't explain our opportunities. They didn't explain what their long term goals are to get the people to move back.
- Reason #1: The land they were going to give us wasn't very good. We wouldn't be able to access it. There weren't any roads into it. It was rocks and stuff.
- Reason #2: The treaty process didn't include off-reserve residents in the final agreement. The final agreement didn't say anything about us, and I was concerned about how we off-reserve people were going to be included.
- Reason #1: There's no real self government, because there's nobody educated enough to do it. Because they never had a business plan. What were they going to do with the money.

continued...



➤ Q.5b) Why Did You Choose to Vote “No” (cont’d)

- Reason #2: They're not offering us anything. It's only for people on reserves. The people living off reserves get nothing, which is always the way it's been.
- Reason #1: I didn't understand what was being voted on. I couldn't get a straight answer from anyone to my questions. Basically what the benefits and shortfalls to us were going to be. My family. Anyone who was blood-lined, not just
- Reason #2: People voted in by the process.
- Reason #1: It's the loss of our status. Not only your medical, and we are an aging population. I think the medical coverage should remain in place. Status refers to the medical coverage. We would lose our medical coverage.
- Reason #2: Lack of understanding the information released. It was pretty complex. It may have been brought down to layman's' terms, but it was still quite confusing when you read it. They tried for layman's' terms, but didn't hit the mark.
- Reason #3: At a meeting, a man asked about the tenure of forest companies and after a great deal of talk, and his continuing to ask, the answer was that they didn't know. A negotiator didn't know.
- Reason #1: It wasn't a good deal. What they were giving away. They were trying to sell away all our rights, it was a bad deal. There was no future with this deal.



➤ Q.5b) Why Did You Choose to Vote “No” (cont’d)

- Reason #1: I didn't see a fair deal in the long run. The dollar figure of \$20 million cash wouldn't build a bridge they're trying to put through now.
- Reason #2: The land being appropriated is raw land that isn't presenting any income at the time of taking possession. All the trees have been or will be taken off of it, so they won't be there to generate income.
- Reason #3: They should be able to draw income off of south Fort George area to provide an income flow while new revenue sources are developed. Taxation of the existing south Fort George area, which is traditional band land.
- Reason #1: Status card. The tax exemption it provides.
- Reason #2: The proportion of land. The percentage of land. The ratio of what was originally demanded at the beginning of the negotiation, and what was offered in the end. An insufficient amount of land.
- Reason #3: Benefit to off-reserve membership. I'm in Comox's, and for me to get involved, I have to be there. There's nothing said about how I could benefit.
- Reason #1: I think we're being gypped out. I think we deserve a lot more than just pennies.

continued...



➤ Q.5b) Why Did You Choose to Vote “No” (cont’d)

- Reason #2: I don't think the people are ready for it. To settle with having anybody going to the table for us. If even one person is not satisfied, then we are not ready.
- Reason #3: I think the government should pay the bill on negotiations because it's their negotiations, not our negotiations. The land is ours and they should negotiate with us on that basis.
- Reason #1: Because of the chiefs. I don't trust them, all of them. They're just all sneaky, all taking, money for themselves. They're not doing anything for the people now, why don't they do something for them now. If you go on the reserve, they're all drug addicts and alcoholics living in poverty. I would never live on the reserve. Nothing will change.
- Reason #2: I would never live on the reserve, and the agreement will not provide for anything for anyone who lives off the reserve.
- Reason #1: All they did was send big binders full of stuff that was hard to understand and I didn't have time to read it. They should have tried a different way to educate the band.
- Reason #2: Also I heard from other bands, a meeting, and they asked us to vote no because the government was giving our band traditional land which was theirs.



➤ Q.5b) Why Did You Choose to Vote “No” (cont’d)

- Reason #1: Because the band wasn't ready, they didn't have the capacity. Administer any incoming revenue. They don't have the skills.
- Reason #2: Own source revenue. I didn't agree with that.
- Reason #1: Because I thought it wasn't a very good package. Not a lot was offered. The financial, the money, and the land, and all the benefits. Our status would be gone without compensation. What we were offered wasn't enough for us.
- Reason #2: The status, members would lose their tax-free status.
- Reason #3: If the treaty went through, and we were self-governed, how long would it last. It's too fast for us to govern ourselves. The finances aren't sufficient. I don't think the band's ready, they need more education and learning.
- Reason #1: You have dumb, dumber, and dumbest, if they can't even run the band office how are they expected to run a business.
- Reason #1: I followed behind my uncle, and he voted no. No other reason.
- Reason #1: I didn't think there was an offer - they are taking away my native status.

continued...



➤ Q.5b) Why Did You Choose to Vote "No" (cont'd)

- Reason #2: I don't think that the LT band is big enough to be separate - to run and operate by ourselves. I don't think there are enough people around here in Prince George.
- Reason #3: We should have had some kind of business right here in Prince George. When they have nothing to show for what they have right now - then I'm not ready to vote for them.
- Reason #1: It was a bad deal. Because it wasn't fair. Because they weren't offering the land that our history entitles us to. The land is in bad areas, not that good and you're not ever going to get money out of it.
- Reason #2: The money wasn't right. I wasn't willing to give up our rights for that sum. Our status rights.
- Reason #1: I'm about to give up my status
- Reason #2: And I don't believe the federal government negotiated in good faith
- Reason #3: And I don't believe our chief understands the whole process himself. The entire treaty process itself.
- Reason #1: Because they don't have anything off reserve.

continued...



➤ Q.5b) Why Did You Choose to Vote “No”

- Reason #2: The agreement was unclear to me.
- Reason #1: It seems unfair to our people. Giving us some land and money for all that's been done to us, and it's not sufficient. A lump sum of money for all that's happened, so what we would lose our status, gain some things, and lose others.
- Reason #1: Because my grandma told me to.
